Journeys - Empowerment through Exploration of Cultural Heritage



PROJECT GOALS

The aim of this project was to develop knowledge, skills and competences of teachers, youth workers and youth leaders about the culture and heritage of diaspora communities (largely migrants and refugees) living in the UK, the Netherlands, Romania, Slovenia and Turkey. The intention is to help preserve, promote and integrate the non-European cultural heritage of those diasporic communities living in Europe who are

the focus of the project: Jave-Indonesian, African, Caribbean, Roma and Gypsies and Afro-Turks, amongst other non-European cultures within the five countries comprising the partnership.

TARGET GROUPS

- Educators, youth workers and youth leaders involved in the preservation and promotion of cultural heritage and diaspora communities
- Young migrants and refugees, but also local disadvantaged youth

BENEFICIARIES

- Educational institutions
- Youth organisations
- Policy makers at local or European level
- NGOs involved in the protection and promotion of diversity, cultural heritage and integration.
- Public organizations and NGOs involved in serving migrants and refugees

WHY WAS THIS INITIATIVE NEEDED?

There is a significant number of culturally diverse diaspora communities in Europe. Educators, youth workers and youth leaders in many European countries often lack insight into the history, specific cultural characteristics and cultural heritage of non-European diaspora (migrants and refugees).

To create and manage a sustainable and integrated society, it is important to recognise and understand the diversity of cultural heritage spaces, places, artifacts, and stories of those


diaspora communities living in Europe. This therefore indicate the need to develop the knowledge, skills and competences of teachers, youth workers and youth leaders for the preservation, promotion and integration of the cultures and heritage of non-European diaspora communities.

PROJECT OUTPUT

- Toolkit consisting of dialogue principles, tools (activities and exercises) and methodologies used to engage participants to the learning process of youth workers, youth leaders and other educators.
- Digital Map/App capturing the history and cultural specificities of the non-European diaspora living in the targeted cities of Ljubljana (Slovenia), London (UK), Amsterdam (the Netherlands), Piatra Neamt (Romania) and Istanbul (Turkey). The App, which also provides a map, showcases uncommon places, spaces, stories and artifacts of non-European diaspora in the respective cities in scope to the project.
- Joint staff training to introduce the Toolkit and its uses, compiling and uploading the
 digital information onto the platform as well as the testing process within each
 partner country. This included research and dialogue processes used in ethnographic
 research.
- A Multiplier Event to launch, share and disseminate the outcome of the project.


WHAT WERE THE KEY COMPONENTS OF THE DELIVERY APPROACH

The Toolkit raises awareness of


cultural differences as well as similarities, examine ways to work effectively with diversity, and explore strategies to effect change and enhance inclusion.

The fundamental aim being to provide an inclusive education, training and youth work practice.


The Toolkit will continue to be refined and revised over the months as we trial and test the range of activities. We want it to be a real and live Toolkit that facilitators could use and adapt in their practice. It will be targeted to those practitioners working in the field of the arts, culture and heritage. It will capture and distil the various dialogue principles, tools and methodologies used in carrying out the research through the study visits and using online data (especially with respect to the diverse diasporic communities in Europe) of the 5

countries such as Jave-Indonesian, African, Caribbean, Roma, and other non-European cultures.






C3 London, February 2023

Hosted by The Ubele Initiative

The key focus of the London event was the bringing together of the learning from the previous events and the launch of the digital map/app. The focus was on understanding the map/app and the development of skills of those educators, facilitators, youth workers and leaders on the programme through the lens of the 'London Experience', which was framed around 'Aspirations, challenges and resilience' of the African Caribbean experience since 1948, symbolised through the landing of https://example.com/html/mailenges-number-1948, symbolised through the landing of https://example.com/html/mailenges-number-1948, symbolised through the landing of https://example.com/html/mailenges-number-1948<

Participants were introduced to some of the challenges that beset the African Caribbean communities over the last 75yrs through keynote speakers such as Jeremy Crooke, <u>Action for Race Equality (ARE)</u> and <u>Patrick Vernon</u>, leading activist and social commentator and leading light in exposing the <u>Windrush Scandal</u>. Not only an understanding of some of the critical phases of the London experience but they were also introduced to some cultural and heritage experiences across London: Haringey, Hackney, Waltham Forest, Lewisham and Lambeth, to name a few sites where visits took place.






The Digital Map/App

The Black Cultural Archives is a repository of Black historical archival materials chronicalling the black communities in the UK. The aim is to collect, preserve and celebrate the histories of people of African and Caribbean descent in the UK and to inspire and give strength to individuals, communities, and society.
